Dear colleagues,

On its 10th Anniversary i.nez - International Network for Co-operation in Mental Health (registered association) has organized together with Professor M. Siebeck. Centre for International Health and Professor N. Müller, Psychiatric Hospital of the LMU, an International Symposium on: "Mental Health in Developing Countries" The Symposium is open to all staff and students interested in health in developing countries.

Since a long time "Mental Health" has been the Cinderella of health care, whether in OECD countries or in developing countries. Attempts to introduce "Mental Health" on the agenda for a global public health are in its infancy.

Over half a billion of the world's population is suffering from neuropsychiatric disorders or from alcohol or drug dependence, the vast majority of patients is living in developing countries. Most patients receive no appropriate treatment - many are stigmatized with prejudice and exclusion. This leads to serious psychological, physical, social and economic damage.

At least 20% -30% of patients in developing countries, who visit primary care facilities, suffer from one or more neuropsychiatric disorders. Particularly important are chronic illnesses such as: depression, substance dependence, schizophrenia, epilepsy and dementia.

This symposium intends to give an overview of neuropsychiatric disorders and their importance to developing countries. Reports from Africa and Asia will illustrate various aspects of the problem.

Mental Health Services should not be a privilege in rich countries, but mental health also in developing countries is of enormous importance both for the individual and for the development of entire regions.
